### *Jim Foulds Fonds*

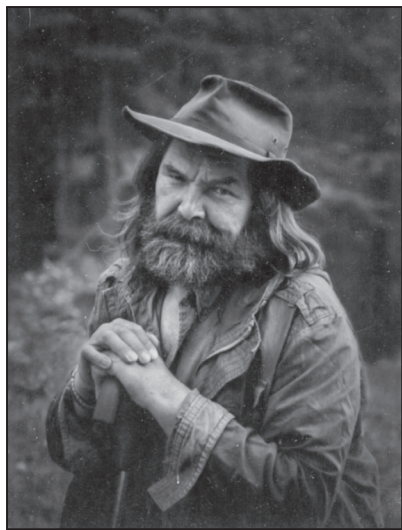

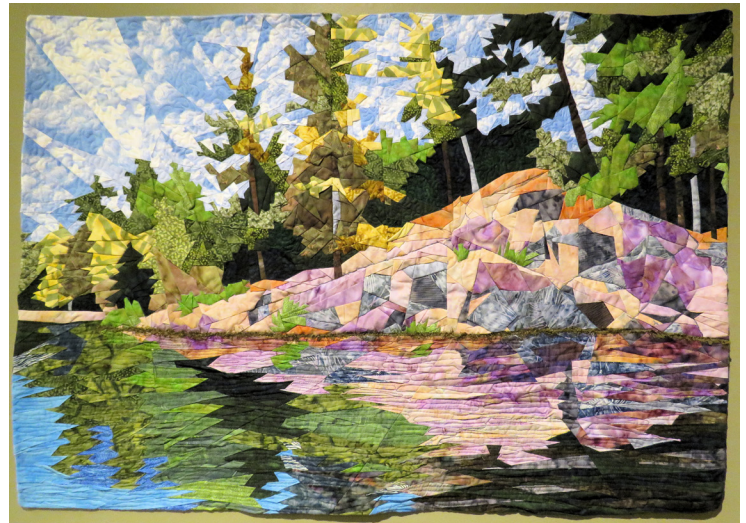
