### Newspaper Digitization

Tor the past five years, Museum staff and volunteers have been digitizing the lo- $\Gamma$  cal newspapers in our collection. Some were done straight from clean microfilm reels but most have been scanned directly from the originals papers, page by page using, first, our photocopier and then a dedicated, large flatbed scanner. Each page was then processed to make it word-searchable, resulting in a product that will save researchers untold hours.

To date, 14 different newspapers have been scanned, covering some 129 years. This means more than 30,000 days of newspaper coverage are now available in the Museum's library. Papers from both Fort William and Port Arthur are included, though not all years cover both communities. We began with the first day of the 1875 Thunder



scanning at present. Anyone seeking access the scans should call the


### Internship

Port Arthur Historical Walking Tour: Ghosts. Intrigue. Hidden Tales.


Sept. 29, 6-8pm. Open to registrants only
